The Renaissance also witnessed the discovery and exploration of ne continents, the substitution of the Copernican for the Ptolemaic system of astronomy, the decline of the feudal system and the growth commerce, and the invention or application of such potentially powerful innovations as paper, printing, the mariner's compass, and gunpowder Restoration In 1660, after 19 years of exile, Charles II took the throne and the monarchy was restored. Historian Roger Baker argues it was, "as though the pendulum [of England's morality] swung from repression to licence more or less overnight." Romantic Era Romanticism can be seen as a rejection of the precepts of order, calm, harmony, balance, idealization, and rationality. Romanticism emphasize the individual, the subjective, the irrational, the imaginative, the personal, the spontaneous, the emotional, the visionary, and the transcendental.
