Over the war years, the number of women in employment rose by over 1.5 million. Over 700 000 worked in the dangerous munitions industry. Some nurses did get sent out to France to work in the trenches. A recurring theme in WW1 literature is the 'Home Front Complacency'. The experience of war at home and the front line was vastly different and some combatants felt that their sacrifice was not being appreciated. During the war, women's writing was seen as less significant as an expression of war since only men had fought. Many of the poems were superb. But there were also verses, of no literary value, by women so obscure that all details of their lives have disappeared. She felt it was important that these should not be left out because they helped modern readers to understand the mindset of the generation that endured the great war. "In my desire to make such poems available once again," Reilly wrote, "I returned to the slim volumes and the anthologies, searching for a representative collection."
